

Mid-Year Update on the LCAP

- · New requirement starting this year
- On or before February 28, at a regularly scheduled board meeting, LEAs must:
 - Present an update on the LCAP and Budget Overview for Parents
 - Must include "all available mid-year outcome data" that relates to the metrics in your LCAP and
 - Must provide all available mid-year expenditure and implementation data on the actions listed in your LCAP.
 - This data is "locally determined"
- No particular required format or template
- No particular posting requirement
- Not to be confused with the "LCAP Annual Update" that is part of the LCAP
 - The mid-year update is not part of the LCAP



Local Control and Accountability Plan Updates

- For each "contributing" action and budgeted expenditure provided on a charter-wide basis, the LCAP must identify one or more specific metrics to monitor outcomes
- Starting in 2024, the only required goals are for schools generating "Equity Multiplier" funding (i.e., the previous criteria for required goals will not continue)
 - These schools must create focus goals for student groups that have the lowest performance level (Red) on one+ Dashboard indicator
 - And "any underlying issues in the credentialing, subject matter preparation, and retention of the school's educators, if applicable."
- LEAs with 30+ English learner students and/or 15+ long-term English learner students must include specific actions related to:
 - the language acquisition programs for ELs/LTELs
 - professional development activities
- Other miscellaneous changes, including related to:
 - Differentiated Assistance—This list/has posted: https://www.cde.ca.gov/fg/aa/lc/
 - Equity Multiplier –This list is expected to post soon

Beware: Impactful Participation Penalties Expanded Again



- English Learner Progress Indicator (ELPI)--starting with the 2023 Dashboard
 - For each student short of 95% participation, non-testers are counted as not making progress
- ELA and Math--since the 2022 Dashboard
 - To each student short of 95% participation, the Dashboard assigns:
 - Score of -277 in ELA
 - Score of -246 in Math
 - If student doesn't answer enough questions on the test to obtain a score, a "LOSS" score for that grade level is assigned
- Work with parents and students to understand the significance

Differentiated Assistance Restarts for charter schools Far More LEAs Are Included, Now

- State accountability under LCFF, based on:
 - State Indicators
 - For two years, in two priority areas
 - A student group receives:
 - Red on an indicator OR
 - Red/Red or Red/Orange in ELA and Math*
 - Local Indicators: "Not Met for 2+ Years"
 - Must report to board in conjunction with LCAP adoption by July 1
 - Clearly include in the agenda as a non-consent item
 - Upload to Dashboard by fall deadline—easy to miss!
- For charter schools, support is provided for "at least one year"
- Based on 2023 Dashboard, 203 of 1271 charter schools (16%) are now "eligible" for Differentiated Assistance
- These schools are not eligible for streamlined renewal with a 5-7 year term ("high") next year

Reminder: Ethnic Studies Graduation Requirement Is Coming

- Requirements:
 - 2025-26: Must offer a one-semester course
 - 2026-27: Incoming Grade 9 students must complete a one-semester course to graduate
- Options:
 - Offer a stand-alone course and/or
 - "Double up" by integrating with another course
 - Ethnic Studies must be the "primary content"
- Planning
 - Do not assume your teacher has the skills to effectively teach the course
 - Highly recommend planning and providing training well in advance

Economic Picture

- Economic conditions remain generally solid
 - · Despite high interest rates
- · Not in a recession
 - · Gross domestic product still growing
 - · Albeit modestly so and slowing in California
- Inflation cooling
 - "Core" inflation was 3.9% per December data
 - Down slightly from 4.0% in November
 - Down significantly from 6.6% peak in late 2022
 - Federal Reserve indicating it will reduce interest rates sometime in 2024
- California unemployment rate at 4.8 percent, up slightly per recent October data

State Revenues Context

- Last year's income tax filing deadline was delayed from April, to October, then to November
- Current (2023-34) state budget adopted last summer
 - State lacked usual April income tax tax data for 2022
 - Had to guesstimate revenues when adopting state budget
- November tax receipts were far short of estimates used to build current budget
 - 2022 state tax revenues were \$24 billion (25 percent) short




State Budget Context

- Legislative Analyst's Office estimates state faces \$68 billion budget "problem"
- Governor pegs budget problem at \$38 billion
- \$30 billion difference is smaller than it appears
 - · Governor's, LAO's methodologies differ a bit
 - Difference is actually +/-\$10 billion after aligning methodologies
 - Governor's revenue estimate is slightly more optimistic: \$15 billion higher
- Either way, it's a big problem in context of a \$208 billion budget


Proposition 98 Education Funding Guarantee

- California Constitution provides minimum funding "floor" for K-14 education based on three tests
 - Tests are computed, recomputed over three-year timeframe (prior, current, upcoming)
 - Currently driven by "Test One" guarantees 40% of state revenues for K-14 education
 - As state revenues go down (or up), K-14 funding guarantee changes 40 cents/dollar
 - School funding "floor" is a direct function of state revenues
- Governor estimates that the Prop 98 Guarantee has dropped to last summer's budget estimates

Governor's Education Budget: Big Picture

- Governor proposes to address the \$14.3 billion Prop 98 Guarantee gap as follows:
 - \$5.7 billion withdrawal from Public School System Stabilization Account (PSAA, "Prop 98 Reserve")
 - \$8 billion "mystery" legislative proposal
 - Other stuff
- No official details on the mysterious \$8 billion "fix"
- CSDC believes it will include reducing prior-year Prop 98 appropriations, replacing with other state funds, then state repays with future state funds
- Trailer bill language due by February 1st

- Puny COLA
- Full speed ahead on Universal Pre-K, Expanded Learning, Equity Multiplier, Community Schools, universal free meals
- Some delays of one-time funding
- A few minor augmentations
- Few cuts, some sacred cows

Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF)

- Puny COLA, declining enrollment makes it relatively cheap for state to fund LCFF
- Governor proposes using one-time PSSSA reserve funds to support ongoing LCFF costs:
 - \$2.8 billion in 2023-24
 - \$2.2 billion in 2024-25
- Use of one-time funds to pay for LCFF begs long-term sustainability questions

- Statutory COLA is based on 8 quarters' worth of federal data
 - We currently have 6 quarters of data
 - CSDC believes Governor's estimate is a bit low
- Low COLA will put strong pressure on school and district budgets

LCFF: Modeling COLA Using FCMAT Calculator

- If you're using version 24.2c of FCMAT's LCFF Calculator, you will need to override the COLA estimates to align with DOF's revised COLA estimates
 - In "Data Entry" tab, line #15, for 2024-25 and beyond
 - FCMAT plans to post updated version of its Calculator soon

Excess ERAF & Charter Schools

- Governor proposes to direct "Excess ERAF" funding to some charter schools
- Stems from reallocation of local property taxes toward school districts in early '90s
 - Using so-called Education Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF)
- In some counties, school districts receive high levels of property taxes
 - They cannot "absorb" any funds from ERAF, leading to "excess" ERAF
- State has long asserted that charter schools should get a share
- Some county auditor-controllers have ignored this, preferring that the "excess" go to their county and other local government agencies
- Governor likely plans to close this loophole, details pending in trailer bill language
- CSDC presumes governor's proposal will not result in more funding for charter schools
 - Instead, state will simply reduce state LCFF funding, dollar for dollar



Equity Multiplier

- · Governor proposes to continue funding for this new, ongoing add-on to LCFF
- Receives the same statutory COLA
- No other apparent changes proposed
- Reminders:
 - Must use to increase/improve evidence-based services
 - Supplement, not supplant LCFF, ELO-P, Reading/Literacy, and Community School funds
 - Additional LCAP components

Instructional Continuity

- Governor to introduce legislation "to allow LEAs to provide attendance recovery opportunities to students to make up lost instructional time"
 - Allow LEAs to add attendance recovery time to ADA funding data
 - Current law allows districts to "recover" lost ADA via Saturday school
 - Proposal will add "intersessional school," "before/after school," "and would be exempt from minimum day requirements"
 - Charter eligibility for Saturday School is disputed, fit may be messy
- Governor also proposes to require LEAs to provide students with access to remote instruction or support to enroll in neighboring LEA for emergencies lasting 5+ days
 - Current law requires plan to offer for 10+ days emergencies if LEA seeks emergency ADA

Instructional Continuity (2)

- Encourage LEAs to provide hybrid or remote learning to students who are unable to attend
- \$6 million, one-time to fund research into:
 - New models of hybrid/remote learning
 - Local student information systems to allow reporting individual student absence data to state
 - Intent to allow state to disaggregate absence data from emergencies
- Details not yet available, presumably will appear in trailer bill later this month



Universal Pre-K

- Governor proposes continued implementation of Universal Pre-K phase-in
- Including multi-year Transitional Kindergarten expansion

Transitional Kindergarten Reminders

- Additional TK teacher training mandate kicks-in August 1, 2025
 - May be good idea to use current local flexibility to locally approve any teachers with equivalent on-the-job experience with preschoolers in advance of deadline
- Carefully monitor enrollment and adult-to-pupil ratio caps
 - Classes with new "Early Enrollment TK" (EETK) students capped at 20 students, 10:1 adult-to-pupil ratio
 - Classes without EETK capped at 24 students, 12:1 ratio
 - Pending audit regulations

Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELO-P)

- · Governor proposes full speed ahead here too
- No statutory COLA
- Continued fixed, \$4 billion statewide appropriation
- Reminder on encumbrance deadlines:
 - 2021-22 and 2022-23 funding must be encumbered by the end of current (2023-24) school year
 - No deadline to encumber or spend the 2023-24 funding (yet)


Mandate to Offer ELO-P Now in Effect

Schools Serving 75%+ Unduplicated Pupil Percentage

- Shall offer access to all K-6 pupils, provide access to all pupils whose parent/guardian requests
- Fixed \$2,750 per PY K-6 ADA x UPP
- Minimum \$50,000 grant

Schools Serving <75% Unduplicated Pupil Percentage

- Shall offer access to all unduplicated K-6 pupils, provide access to unduplicated pupils whose parent/guardian requests
- \$1,803 per PY K-6 ADA x UPP in 2023-24
- Funding rate varies, declined substantially from \$2,054 in 2022-23
- Likely to decline again in 2024-25
- Minimum \$50,000 grant



Charter School Facilities Grant Program

- Reimburses lease/rent costs for charter schools serving 55%+ low-income students
 - Funds lesser of \$1,431/ADA or 75 percent of eligible costs
 - Two components: (1) Rent/lease, (2) "other" costs
 - Current-year budget contains \$30 million augmentation for "other" costs
- Governor proposes:
 - Deleting \$30 million to fund "other" costs in 2024-25
 - "Consistent with the 2022 Budget Act agreement"
 - \$6.6 million "current service level" augmentation
 - Statutory COLA

Prop 28 Arts & Music in Schools Funding

- Sets-aside 1 percent of Proposition 98 Guarantee funding for arts education
 - Decline in Guarantee might normally trigger cut to funding rate
 - Governor's Budget appears to largely avoid this cut in current, 2023-24 fiscal year
- CSDC estimates:
 - 2023-24: \$110/student, plus \$77/low-income student
 - 2024-25: Same as above, subject to revision
 - Initial funds will begin to flow in February's First Principal Apportionment payment
- Governor proposes CTC create a new elementary Arts and Music authorization for career-technical teachers



Prop 28 Arts & and Music in Schools Funding

- Reminders:
 - Must spend to supplement, not supplant existing funding for arts education
 - · Must allocate funding to each school site based on its data
 - School must create an expenditure plan
 - LEAs with 500+ pupils must spend 80%+ to employ arts education staff
 - Remaining spent on training, supplies and materials, and arts education partnership programs
 - CDE may waive these requirements upon request of school principal, "for good cause shown"
 - 1% cap on administrative expenses
 - · Funds available for up to three years, unspent funds revert to CDE
 - Post annual board-approved report on website detailing how funds were spent, submit to CDE
 - Compliance subject to audit (audit guidelines under development, likely adopted by March)
 - Pending Audit Guide regulations


Teacher Prep & Professional Development

- Governor proposes streamlining credentialing requirements:
- Streamline basic skills requirement
 - Eight current options, including CBEST, other tests, coursework, etc.
 - Governor proposes deeming completion of bachelor's degree as satisfying basic skills requirement
 - Streamline transcript review for subject-matter competency



Special Education

- COLA increases statewide target rate to \$894
- No other major new SPED proposals from Governor thus far . . .

Mandate Block Grant

- COLA would increase per-ADA rates slightly for charter schools in 2024-25:
 - Grades K-8: \$20.00
 - Grades 9-12: \$55.59
- Governor proposes \$25 million augmentation to pay for forthcoming dyslexia screening mandate
 - · No details yet beyond topline



- · Governor has big plans for career education
- Convening interagency teams at state and local (K-16 Regional Collaboratives) levels
- · Working on new Master Plan for Career Education
- Ongoing \$300 million appropriation for Career-Technical Education Incentive Grant



Proposed Minor Augmentations

- \$20 million, one-time for professional development for math teachers to implement state's new Math Framework
- \$7 million, one-time to develop bank of curriculum-embedded performance tasks to support "inquiry-based science instruction and assessment"
- \$5 million, ongoing, for California College Guidance Initiative
- \$5 million, one-time, broadband infrastructure
- \$3.2 million increase, ongoing, for K-12 High Speed Network
- \$2.1 million increase, ongoing, for California state parks access for fourth graders
- \$2 million, ongoing for new Inclusive College Technical Assistance Center
- \$1.5 million increase, ongoing to maintain Homeless Education Technical Assistance Centers





Audit Guide Amendments

- State Controller is in final stages of packaging proposed amendments to Audit Guide regulations
- Several key pieces to monitor with potential for non-compliance penalties:
- Arts & Music in Schools compliance
 - Extensive testing on mandatory certifications, allowable expenditures, supplement not supplant
- LCAP midyear update compliance
- Updates to ELO-P
 - Verify compliance with health screening, fingerprinting clearance of personnel, volunteers, third-party vendor compliance
- Expanded Learning Opportunities Grant-compliance with reporting to CDE in 2024-25
- Early Enrollment Transitional Kindergarten-compliance with class size, adult ratio caps



CSDC's Budget Observations

Governor's proposals are comforting given state's fiscal distress



- Comfort is thin due to several factors:
 - √\$8 billion Prop 98 "fix" may not fly
 - ✓ State is spending half of the PSSSA (Prop 98 Reserve) leaving little "cushion"
 - ✓ Much of this one-time PSSSA funding is used to pay for ongoing LCFF funding.
 - ✓ Governor's revenue estimates are more optimistic than Legislative Analyst's, even if plausible
 - ✓ Economic, state revenue picture face many risks
 - ✓ Both Legislative Analyst and Governor estimate the state faces a major, structural budget problem in future years

CSDC's Budget Development Suggestions

- Governor's estimates are "plausible," but lean toward "glass half full"
- Governor's January Budget is just the first step in a long process
- · A lot can happen between now and when "final" budget is adopted
- · Picture won't begin to clarify until May Revise
- Volatile economic and state revenue picture requires you to plan for broad range of possibilities
- You need to plan for "glass half-empty" and worse
- Run projected budgets with and without COLAs
- Ensure cash positions can withstand deferrals
- Monitor economic conditions closely
- Ensure staff understand charter schools typically receive less funding than districts
